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Syllabus: Critical Thinking in Science Fiction

# **Course Description**

This one-semester course introduces students to one of the most popular genres of fiction: sci-fi. Students will come to understand the origin and development of the genre, as well as the fundamental features of its various subgenres. This course will explore the notion of sci-fi both as a bellwether and as an allegory—using other worlds and future scenarios as analogies for our own. Various story selections, three full novels, and several films comprise the material on which discussions will be founded.

#### **Required Purchase**

Additionally, students are required to purchase their own copy of the following novel: *Never Let Me Go,* by Kazuo Ishiguro. Though you may use any unabridged version of the novel, the edition used in class carries the following ISBN: 978-1400078776.
